Soon, the Wayne campus will have a new paved parking lot after a new playground is installed (for the infant to 5-year-old Head Start program) in the grassy area of the lot.


This only happened because of your prayers and commitment to see people have a closer relationship with Jesus through the Touching Tomorrow Today capital campaign.

# The Purpose Driven Church Conference

Saddleback Church held its 2019 Purpose Driven Church equipping God's people to Conference, June 25 through the 27. New Hope was represented by 10 participants: Pastor and Velicia Humes, Dan and Wendy Kahill, Michael and Laurecia Witherspoon, Felicia Jordan, Deloris Nichols, and Shelby and Alexis Wilson. There were over 3,000 attendees representing countries including Europe, Asia, Australia, South America, North America and Africa.

The Purpose Driven Conference is much more than a three-day getaway. It's a modern real-world application for the plan God has in store for us based on the teachings of the Bible. The ideology behind having a purpose driven church is

obvious and simple: care for the world. The five principles that hold together the purpose driven philosophy are: worship, ministry, evangelism, discipleship and fellowship. While some of these words may not seem applicable to non-Christians, they help solve our basic human needs of belonging and purpose. This thinking is not changing the principles of Christianity but is instead helping to revolutionize the view of Christianity and hopefully its followers, bringing people into the church and closer to Christ.

Over the course of the conference, Rick Warren explained a concept that I think many Christians forget, "People haven't lost faith in Christ, they've lost

faith in the church." During the conference he explained how people used to look to the Church for spiritual and physical healing, but with the work of man comes flaws. In attempting to carry out God's mission, some of His servants have become focused on the wrong parts of His message instead of realizing that His word has a cross-generational theme in this world—love. In times of division or uncertainty it is the purpose of the Church to step in and help heal the community through love, the way Jesus would have (and did in His time). With a little hope and a lot of prayer and patience, the Purpose Driven Church Conference shows how any church, regardless of denomination can fulfill God's purpose in a modern era and expand the Kingdom of God.



#### ABC's of Health

It's not unusual to read in the media or to hear on TV that certain medical conditions have a disparate impact in the African American community. We've heard them so much that maybe we come to expect to hear the numbers and then ignore them. But I and others on the Congregational Care team have a heightened awareness of the significance of these reports because, on a weekly basis we receive calls informing us that a member of New Hope is in the hospital awaiting surgery. We pray for a successful surgery, God's healing, and a return to worship service in God's own timing.

Occasionally, there is a brief stay in a rehab facility. But on those visits, we see others who have been in the facility for extended periods of time. Many of them are our African American brothers and sisters. Additionally, we have been called to comfort a family at the moment they have lost a loved one due to illness and medical complications.

This perspective led me and others on the Congregational Care team to take to heart Pastor Humes' call for New Hope members to know their ABCs on health care:

A= A<sub>1</sub>C

B= Blood pressure

C= Cholesterol

And recently on a Channel 7 News report on men's health, a physician added another measure:

BMI ratio = .50

We have excellent health offerings here at New Hope. It's not clear how many of us are taking advantage of them. We know, however, that some of our members are in excellent physical condition. They are probably monitoring their medical profile with their Fitbit and Apple Watches as they leave the gym on a daily basis. Some of us are managing our health by taking medicine or following a diet as prescribed by our doctors. Yet, when we get our text from the Pastor, we are brought back to the reality that here as well as nationally, there is still much more work to be done regarding the health of members in our African American community.

With that said, we believe the best first step is knowledge. Therefore, this is a plea for every member of New Hope to follow the pastor's lead and get your numbers.

The many benefits of knowing your ABCs will be outlined in future issues on health. In the meantime, when he asks if you know your ABC's, you will say:

A= 7.7 B= 138/80

C= 167



## On My Honor

Becoming an Eagle Scout has been a dream of mine for some time. Ever since second grade when I started as a Cub Scout, I knew I wanted to be an Eagle Scout. Both my father and my grandfather had been Boy Scouts and so to some extent scouting runs in my family. This is why I was happy to have my family, friends, Pastor Humes, and other church family members come out to celebrate with me at my Eagle Scout Court on Honor on Saturday, June 8. The ceremony was also important to me because in 2013 my grandfather passed away. Prior to his death, we talked about Boy Scouts and the importance of being an Eagle Scout and so it meant a lot to me to honor him posthumously by presenting him my mentor pin during the ceremony.

The ceremony also represented the end of a long journey and signaled a great


honor because only 4% of Boy Scouts ever become an Eagle Scout and so few Eagle Scouts are African Americans (this is why they call us the 1%). The road to Eagle Scout is long and rigorous. I started the process in March 2013. It took years for me to move through the ranks: Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life, and finally Eagle. The requirements are that you must obtain 21 merit badges (I earned 37) in a specific subject area, complete a substantive service project and finally, go before a board of review and answer questions.

For my Eagle Scout project, I placed Buddy Benches in 3 local elementary schools. Two in the Plymouth Canton School District and one at Hicks Elementary, the school adopted by the church. I chose Buddy Benches because it is an easy way to prevent bullying. It eliminates loneliness

and fosters friendships and kindness on the school playground. So many kids suffer from isolation and bullying in schools. To me the Buddy Bench is an easy way to remedy this because students who have no one to play with can simply sit on the bench and this signals to other students on the playground that this student needs someone to play with them.

One of the best things about doing the Buddy Bench at Hicks Elementary was the opportunity to work with and support the church's efforts in the local community. Community service isn't something you do because of requirements. It is something you do to make a difference in someone's life. I know these benches will help some kids make friends and prevent others from being picked on. This is why I did it and this is why this project was special to me.
